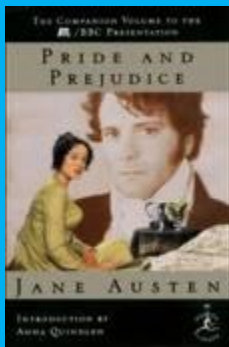

Anderson, Laurie Halse. Speak. New York : Puffin, 2001, c1999.

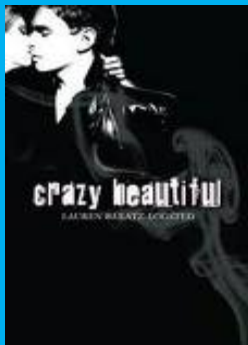
A traumatic event near the end of the summer has a devastating effect on Melinda's freshman year in high school.

Austen, Jane, 1775-1817. Pride and prejudice. Dover ed. New York : Dover Publications, 1995.

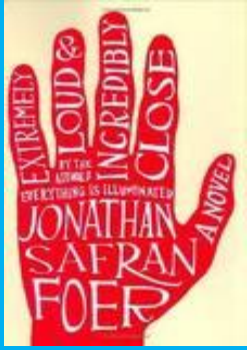
In early nineteenth-century England, a spirited young woman copes with the courtship of a snobbish gentleman as well as the romantic entanglements of her four sisters.

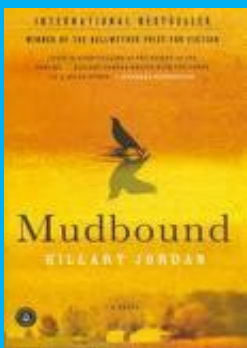

Hillary Jordan. Mudbound. 1st. Chapel Hill : Algonquin Books, 2008.

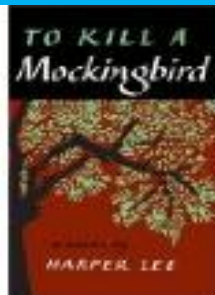

Lee, Harper. To kill a mockingbird. New York : Warner, 1982, c1960.

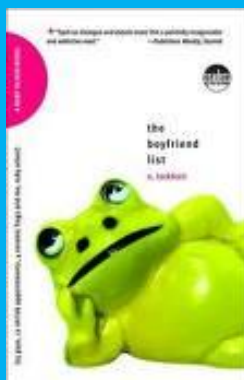
Two small children in a small Alabama town are thrust into an adult world of racial bigotry and hatred when their lawyer father chooses to defend a black man charged with raping a white girl.

Lewis, Michael (Michael M.). The blind side : evolution of a game. New York : W.W. Norton, c2009.

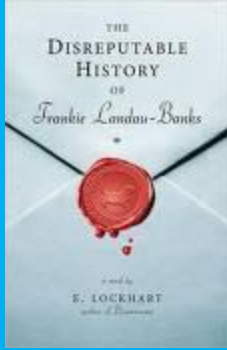

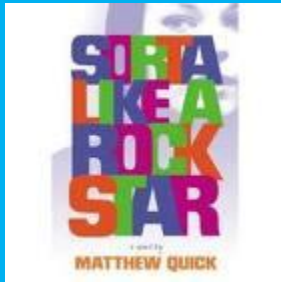

Frankie Landau-Banks attempts to take over a secret, all-male society at her exclusive prep school, and her antics with the group soon draw some unlikely attention and have unexpected consequences that could change her life forever.

Amber Appleton, living in a school bus with her mom, refuses to give in to despair and continues visiting the elderly at a nursing home, teaching English to Korean women, and caring for a Vietnam veteran and his dog, but a fatal tragedy may prove to be one burden too many for the seventeen-year-old girl.

Runyon, Brent. The burn journals. 1st Vintage Books ed. New York : Vintage Books, 2005, c2004.

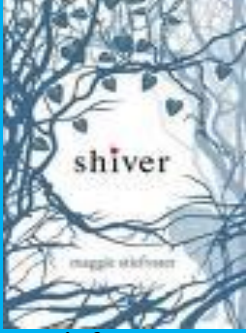
Presents the true story of Brent Runyon who at fourteen set himself on fire and sustained burns over eighty percent of his body, and describes the months of physical and mental rehabilitation that followed as he attempted to pull his life together.



F Shusterman
